# Back to school: updates on 21 Macomb County school districts as students return School leaders focus on filling teaching vacancies, plugging security holes

Kristi Nickel always looks forward to the crisp days In September that mark the return to school.

Now in her 20th year of being a teacher in the mount Clemens Community Schools District, Nickel has more on her plate than ever before. In addition to working in the high school, she serves as president of the teachers union and she and her husband are the proud parents of Melanie, 6, and 18-month-old Charlie.

But despite her busy schedule, Nickel looks forward to the upcoming year and all it brings.

"In the fall, everyone has had a long summer and we've enjoyed it," she said.

"But I think we're all eager to get back. Change is hard for everyone, but it's change in a good way. It's a brand new school year, brand new opportunities for learning and brand new people to meet."

With that in mind, here is a brief look at some of the new faces, places and safety spaces that students in every Macomb County district will see for the next 10 months.

## **Anchor Bay School District**

New faces

The St. Clair County-based district hired more than 20 near teachers over the summer, including five new social workers. A special education supervisor and an at-risk coordinator were also added.

# New places

Twenty administrators and staff members became ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) trainers, preparing for active shooting situations.

Voters will act on a proposed \$169 million bond issue on Nov. 6 that school officials say would allow the district to complete facility upgrades, address transportation concerns, and enhance building security. If approved, the bond would not result in a tax increase, according to school officials.

A Maker's Space has been added at Middle School South to allow students a place to make or craft anything they want.

#### **Armada Area Schools**

Andy Kasti will provide new leadership at Armada High School as he takes over as the building principal. He worked as the Richmond High School principal over the last four years.

# New places

According to Superintendent Michael Musary, the district went through a five-year strategic planning process in the spring and will be rolling out new initiatives in the fall. The last two years have been a challenge and a major goal is to bring more joy back to education. The new vision of the district is to have a community of excellence, achievement, and joy.

Also, Armada Area Schools will have three proposals on the Nov. 8 ballot, and none will increase current residential property taxes.

The proposals include 1) 18 mills for non-homestead property renewal 2) 0.85 mills for the sinking fund, and 3) \$26.5 million bond issue for several district improvements.

A detailed list of the \$26.5 million bond issue can be found on the district website at armadaschools.org.

A few of the improvements of the upcoming bond issue include new high school entrance and offices; a parking expansion at the elementary school; cafeteria expansion at the middle school; new student and staff furniture; paving throughout the district; synthetic turf for the soccer/football field and varsity softball field; and new buses.

## Safety spaces

Another improvement of the bond proposal will be to install new safety entrances at the high school and Macomb Academy of Arts & Sciences.



Construction has been underway as Center Line High School's Industry, Technology, & Innovation (ITI) Academy prepares for its new heavy equipment operation & repair training program in partnership with AIS Construction Equipment. After completion of a hands-on two-year program, students will be employable at companies like AIS, Caterpillar, or John Deere.

In another part of the building ,the Health & Human Services (HHS) Academy is preparing its new \$80,000 Anatomage table.

The table is the most technologically advanced 3D anatomy visualization and virtual dissection tool for anatomy and physiology education.

Similar to a X-ray machine, the table has been adopted by many of the world's leading medical schools and institutions.



He was named Lakeview High School Teacher of the Year in 2004.


Across town at Seminole Academy, Bethel takes over as principal.





Training sessions placed staff members in realistic scenarios in a variety of school environments such as classrooms, hallways, media centers, and cafeterias.

Other safety protocols include security cameras installed throughout district facilities, including busses, with real-time access by local police departments and the county; school resource officers stationed in all three high schools; regular A.L.I.C.E. drills; all staff crisis drills; secure entrances with controlled access; and an extensive security and crisis management plan.

#### Warren Woods Public Schools

New faces

Warren Woods is welcoming two new administrators this year — Pinewood Elementary School Principal Heather Brodi and Warren Woods Middle School Assistant Principal Jennifer Boggio.

The district hired about 10 new teachers.

#### **New Places**

Warren Woods hosted the largest summer school program it has ever held with more than 250 students enrolled in grades K-5 and over 230 students at the secondary level

The district will launch in-school 1:1 device accessibility for all high school students in the fall. All high school students will have access to a laptop in every course.

Other classroom upgrades include each high school room will be equipped with a Smart panel, document camera and sound system funded by the 2020 bond issue. Identical systems were installed in kindergarten through eighth grade at the start of last year.

A new math program for grades K-5 will be unveiled in September. An investigation and pilot program for the Bridges Math program will follow. Officials anticipate the new tools and resources will help both teachers and students.
