

- 1. If you have been convicted of a "listed offense" as defined in section 2 of the Sex Offender Registration Act you are prohibited from volunteering at your child's school.
- 2. All other Felony and Misdemeanor offenses will be subject to a targeted screen and you may be further questioned.

# Parking Lot

Leaders in <u>the</u> Lot!

At Arrival:

- Students riding the bus will be released directly from their busses at 8:27 into the building. They will not "line-up" and wait outside. Staff will be present within the building for assistance as students go directly to their classroom.
- Walkers/Drivers will line-up at their designated areas to be escorted in by teachers when the music begins at 8:27.
- Safeties/Service Squad students and children receiving breakfast may enter the building starting at 8:15.

At Dismissal:


- If an older student is meeting younger siblings to walk or ride home, they will meet at the following location:
  - Kindergarten & 1st Grade should meet at their respective exit doors.
  - 2nd-5th grades should meet at the flagpole outside the front entrance.

At Arrival & Dismissal:

- Door 3 (door closest to bus loop) is designated as "Bussers Only". Students taking the bus will both enter and exit the building via this entrance. All non-bussing students are rerouted to another door.
- Crossing guards will be positioned at the sidewalk area between the exiting driveway and bus loop, near the flagpole and in the parking lot.
- > Teachers will be stationed in areas around the building.

## Birthday Treat Reminders

We welcome our students to celebrate birthdays with their class. Some classrooms have specific treat requirements and classrooms have allergies that you have been made aware of. In order to ensure the safety of all our students, meet allergy and dietary needs, and ensure treats can be shared in a timely manner, the following additional guidelines must be followed.

- ✓ All treats must be individually wrapped
- $\checkmark$  All items must be labeled with their ingredients
- ✓ Treats should not replace lunch (no pizza, tacos, etc)
- ✓ ONE item can be shared (ie treat or drink not both)
- ✓ Items must be easy for children to eat on their own (ie no cutting/scooping required)
- ✓ If spoons and napkins are needed, they must be provided by family
- ✓ Enough treats should be available for all students in class. If you do not know the specific number of children in your child's class, assume 30 in grades K-2 and 33 in grades 3-5. Any extras will be sent home with your child.
- ✓ Healthy & non-food treats are encouraged ☺

#### Welcome Back to the Café!

Reminder on Free & Reduced Price School Lunches

Pizza Day is Monday

 Requesting Benefits for the 1<sup>st</sup> Time:
 Families can quickly and easily fill-out a family application for free/reduced meal benefits by visiting:
 www.lunchapp.com

Requesting Continuation of Benefits: Families with students receiving benefits last year MUST submit the 19/20 application this year as well. Applications for returning students MUST be submitted and approved by Oct. 12<sup>th</sup> to prevent a stop in benefits.

 Paper Applications can be obtained from the front office but the processing time is not a quick as completing the application online www.lunchapp.com Just a few reminders as we start another school year!

Students order lunch 1 day in advance. That means, if your child wants pizza on Monday, he orders on Friday. It is very important that we have an accurate count so we have enough food ordered for everyone. If your child does not like lunch on a particular day, a turkey julienne salad and sandwiches (ham & cheese, turkey, pb&j) are available – they also must be ordered 1 day in advance.

- Kindergarteners and First Graders receive a menu for ordering their lunches at the beginning of each month. Please sit down with your child and discuss the menu and what he/she would like to order. Circle the item on your menu to share the information with your teacher. Be sure to bring a lunch to school on the days, "hot lunch" is not ordered
- Students in grades 2-5 order hot lunch during morning attendance.

## MEDICATION

#### THE INFORMATION BELOW IS NOT INTENDED AS MEDICAL ADVICE. IT IS DESIGNED TO PROVIDE GUIDELINES UNTIL A DOCTOR CAN BE CONTACTED

#### FEVER:

A fever is a warning that all is not right with the body. The best way to check for a fever is with a thermometer, which every home should have. No child with a fever of 100 degrees or above should be sent to school. Do not allow a child to return to school until he/she has been fever free for 24 hours. Notify your physician of significant elevations and/or persistent fevers.

COLD, SORE THROAT or COUGH: The common cold presents the most frequent problems to parents. A child that just feels miserable has nasal congestion or discharge, or hacking cough belongs home in bed, even though he has no fever. If your child complains of a sore throat and has no other symptoms, he may go to school, unless their throat is severely sore, has swelling, has white or yellow spots seen in the back of the throat, or has a fever present. Please keep him/her home and call your doctor.

STOMACH ACHE-VOMITING - DIARRHEA: Consult your doctor if your child has a stomachache which is persistent or severe enough to limit his activity. If vomiting occurs, keep your child home until he can keep his food down. Students who vomit in school may return after 24 hours. A child with diarrhea should be kept at home. Call your doctor if prompt improvement does not occur.

#### RASH:

A rash may be the first sign of one of the many childhood's illnesses. A rash may cover the entire body or may appear in only one area. Do not send a child with a rash to school until your doctor has said that it is safe to do so.

## 🏶 CHILDREN'S HEALTH

#### REMEMBER TO CONTACT OUR HEALTH AIDE IF YOUR CHILD REQUIRES AN ALLERGY ACTION PLAN

HEADACHE: A child, whose only complaint is a headache, usually need not be kept home. Check for other symptoms accompanying your child's headache. Notify vour child's doctor promptly if unexplained fever, violent vomiting, stiff neck, confusion, disorientation, or excess drowsiness accompanies a headache. It is important to note that a lot of mid-morning headaches occur as a result of inadequate breakfasts. Children of this age need breakfast in the morning.

HEAD LICE: It is recommended that you check your child's hair periodically throughout the year for head lice. Head lice are shared easily among children of this age. The nits, (eggs of a louse), are gray or silvery in color, and unlike dandruff, they won't flake off the hair shaft. The louse is gray to brown in color and vary in size. They are mobile, but they do not fly! If you feel your child may have head lice, keep them home and have someone identify if your child has lice. If confirmed, notify the school and treat your child's head with a lice shampoo. Wash and clean all clothing and personal belongings, and check for nits in your child's hair. Your child may return to school when all lice and nits are gone.

PINK EYE: Do not send your child to school if you notice yellow or greenish drainage, causing crusting of the eyelids on awakening. Sometimes the white of the eye and eyelids will become swollen and red. If the diagnosis of pink eye is confirmed, your child will be required to remain at home for 24 hours after treatment has been initiated.

CHICKEN POX: All children entering school should have had the vaccine or the reliable history of the disease. But if your child should get chicken pox, they need to be excluded for school at least 7 days from the onset of rash. The pocks must be dry before returning to school. Notify the school of your child's episode.

If your child has been diagnosed with a communicable illness, please contact the school office to report such things as chicken pox, impetigo, scabies, hepatitis, head lice, and ringworm. The Macomb County Health Department requires this information

# **3RD GRADE READING LAW** A Parent Guide to Public Act 306

### What Is The Law All About?

- In an effort to boost reading achievement, Michigan lawmakers passed Public Act 306 in October 2016.
- To help more students be proficient by the end of 3rd grade, the law requires extra support for K-3 students who are not reading at grade level.
- The law also states that a child may be retained in 3rd grade if they are one or more grade levels behind in reading at the end of 3rd grade.

### What Do I Need to Know As A Parent?

- Your child's reading progress will be closely monitored beginning in kindergarten.
- If your child is not reading where expected, a plan to improve reading will be created. This means your child's teacher and school will work with your child to find where your child needs support in his/her reading development and create a plan to support him or her. This plan includes:



- Extra instruction or support in areas of need.
- Ongoing checks on reading progress.
- A read-at-home plan that encourages you and your child to read and write outside of the school day.
- Your child may be encouraged to participate in summer reading programs.
- The extra supports in your child's reading improvement plan will occur in small groups during the school day. Your child will not miss regular reading instruction.
- Starting in the 2019-2020 school year, in order to be promoted from 3rd to 4th grade, your child must score less than one year behind on the state reading assessment, or demonstrate a 3rd grade reading level through an alternate test or portfolio of student work.
- If you are notified your child may be retained, you have the right to meet with school officials and to request, within 30 days, an exemption if in the best interest of your child. The district superintendent will make the final decision.

# **3** What Can I Do To Support My Child?

Read at home with your child daily with books they enjoy —even in the summer. Some ways to do this:



- Read out loud to your child.
- Listen to your child read.
- Echo read (You read a line, then they repeat).
- Read together at the same time.
- Reread or retell favorite stories.
- Talk to your child about the reading.

#### As you read:

- Ask your child to share what they remember.
- Ask questions about the reading.
- Talk about your favorite parts, what you've learned, or who is in the book and what they do.
- Talk about the pictures in the book how they connect to the words on the page.
- Help connect the stories to your child's life or other books you've read.

#### Additional Tips:

- Talk to and with your kids a lot knowing more words helps kids to better understand the words they read.
- Encourage writing Let children write the sounds they hear; spelling is developmental and a work in progress.
- Be involved in your child's education and support the reading plan if your child has one.





- Understand and using question words (e.g., who, what, where, when, why, how) in discussions
- Learn to recognize, spell, and properly use those little grammatical words that hold the language together (e.g., a, the, to, of, from, I, is, are





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

in detail what they have read by referring to details or information from the text. In writing, students will organize their ideas and develop topics with reasons, facts, details, and other information. Fourth grade students will:

- Describe the basic elements of stories such as characters, events, and settings — by drawing on specific details in the text
- Pay close attention to key features of informational books and articles: these include understanding the main and supporting ideas; being able to compare and contrast information; and explaining how the author uses facts, details, and evidence to support particular points
- Compare ideas, characters, events, and settings in stories and myths from different cultures
- Write summaries or opinions about topics supported with a set of well-organized facts, details, and examples
- Paraphrase and respond to information presented in discussions, such as comparing and contrasting ideas and analyzing evidence that speakers use to support particular points
- Write complete sentences with correct capitalization and spelling



# Office 365

#### What is Office 365 for students?

Students also get Office ProPlus – Office Pro Plus allows students to download Office programs on up to 5 home computers (Windows or Macintosh), plus they can install the Office apps on up to five tablets (iPad, Android, WinRT) and on up to five phones!

#### How do I get free Office 365 ProPlus?

Activate your Office ProPlus following the directions below.

- 1. Go to Office.com/GetOffice365
- 2. Click the "Find out if you're eligible" link
- 3. Put in your school provided email address
- 4. Follow the link that was sent to your email to complete the registration
- 5. Install Office and sign-in with your newly created Office 365 ID

### Frequently Asked Questions – For Students

#### What does Office 365 ProPlus include?

Office 365 ProPlus comes with a full version of Office and familiar Office applications like Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook, OneNote and more. Office 365 ProPlus is a user-based service and allows each student to install on up to five PCs or Macs, and five tablets (iPad or Android) and access Office mobile applications on iPhone and Android phones. (Office Mobile applications are included with all Windows phones). More information <u>here</u>.

#### Do I get anything else besides Office 365 ProPlus when I use the self-service process?

In addition to having access to the Office ProPlus client which has application like Word, Excel, PowerPoint and OneNote, which work across your PCs and Macs, you can active the clients on your iPad, iPhone, Android tablet and Android Phone, giving you access to edit and review your homework on the go. You also get 1 TB of storage through OneDrive for Business to ensure you access to all of your documents whenever you need them. If you using a computer that doesn't have Office installed, don't worry you can edit or review those assignments in Office Online in any browser.

### What devices can I use Office 365 ProPlus on?

Office supports PCs and Windows tablets running Windows 7 or higher, and Macs with Mac OS X 10.6 or higher. Office for iPad can be installed on iPads running version 7.0 or higher. For information about mobile devices, visit <a href="http://www.office.com/mobile">www.office.com/mobile</a>.


