# Medical Academy Chippewa Valley High School

\*NOTE: Medical English can ONLY be taken if <u>also</u> taking Medical Careers I (for Juniors)

or

Medical Careers II (for Seniors)

#### **Enrolling in the Senior level of the Medical Academy (Med English and Med Careers) is:**

- -by application only
- -only open to students who were in the Junior level of the Med Academy
- -dependent on the student having the grade of B- or higher in Medical English 11 & in Med Careers I for first quarter, 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, and overall 1<sup>st</sup> semester grade.
- -dependent on the student having the appropriate and necessary skill set to safely be placed in a hospital setting

#### For students who meet the above criteria, applicants are evaluated on:

- -grades obtained in Med English & Med Careers classes (B- or higher; A/A- recommended)
- -attendance and tardy record in all classes
- -employability skills (behavioral readiness)
- -mastery of enough course content (particularly hands-on skills and medical terminology) to be safe for field placement
- -ability to represent the Chippewa Valley Medical Academy and Chippewa Valley High School in a positive, upstanding manner.

Applications are made available in late January of the student's Junior year.

### Medical English 11: Curriculum Roadmap

#### Quarter 1

- Core text: Holding Silvan by Monica Wesolowska
- <u>Elements of Study</u>: goal setting & mental health; literary elements of memoirs; neonatal medicine, end-of-life care, right-to-die issues, & medical ethics; argumentative writing and APA vs. MLA style.



#### ME11 QUARTER 2

Core text: "Walking Out" by David Quammen

• Elements of Study: non-fiction and realistic fiction readings with themes related to medical emergencies and self-survival; methods of analyzing literature, poetry, and visual mediums for theme, symbolism, metaphor, historical context, etc.; methods of character, setting, and plot development; comparing/contrasting stories and authors' styles; rhetorical analysis writing and APA format.

#### ME11 Quarter 3

- <u>Core texts</u>: Born On a Blue Day by Daniel Tammet and Autism: the Musical (documentary by Tricia Regan)
- Elements of Study: autobiography vs biography; research and APA-style research paper; compare/contrast and synthesis writing; various lessons related to Neurology (such as Autism spectrum disorder, savant syndrome, synesthesia, and other brain conditions and disorders); brain development and function; the teen brain.





#### ME11 Quarter 4

- Core texts: My Sister's Keeper by Jodi Piccoult &/or Brave New World by Aldous Huxley
- Elements of Study: literary features of science-fiction; advancements in biomedicine and biotechnologies (and what the near future may look like based upon these); biomedical ethics; assessing source credibility; research and critical analysis; elements of persuasion- how to identify, analyze, and use; continued practice with framing and then supporting an argumentative stance.

\*REMINDER: Medical English 11 can ONLY be taken if student also signs up to take Medical Careers I.

Core text: Final Exam by Dr. Pauline Chen

<u>Elements of Study</u>: preparing for college- how to request letters of recommendation; reading and analysis; synthesizing and presenting information from multiple sources; review of APA formatting style; issues affecting delivery of quality healthcare; realities of working in healthcare.
