About 1,000 people are expected to attend the Kiwanis Club of Utica-Shelby Township's 27th Bill Hoehn Memorial Bicycle Safety Rodeo and Family Safety Fair, which takes place 11 a.m.-2 p.m. June 7.

Bicycle helmets will be given away at the free event at Whispering Woods Kiwanis Park, 11000 21 Mile Road, Shelby Township.

There are prizes for the best-decorated bicycle, a bicycle safety course, bike inspection and bike raffles. Children can enjoy bounce houses, a magic show, balloons and face painting. Shelby Township police personnel will make ID cards for children.

"Every year we have 400 to 500 children who attend," Peterson said. "The idea is to promote bicycle safety and give back to the community. We give out 300 to 400 helmets and we make sure they are properly fitted."

Fitters and fitter trainers come from the Detroit Medical Center.

"Shelby Fire Department has a Smoke House so that kids know how to get out of a burning structure. They bring their big rigs. Kids love that. Then we have our safety course to make sure they know how to use their bikes. It all goes back to Kiwanis serving children of the community," he said.

"Kiwanis recognizes the need in our community to serve our families with safe and educational play areas in an outdoor learning environment," Heldt said.

She said Whispering Woods has an "inclusive playground designed to be accessible for physically challenged, special-needs and able-bodied children alike, allowing kids to play together and benefit from interaction with their peers."

The park is used by older children involved in tournaments and summer sports camps.

"Having a play area for their younger siblings helps the children play safely and close to their family members and creates a safe, clean and spacious playground for children 5-12 years of age," Heldt said.

The group has helped provide a tot lot and pavilion, dugouts and playground equipment.

Heldt said her club has been providing services to the community since 1957. Kiwanians participate in prayer breakfasts, roadside cleanups and blood drives, and supports Kids On the Go, a nonprofit that provides physical, occupational and speech therapy in a summer camp setting for children with special needs.

Heldt said Eisenhower Key Club members were among 180 volunteers who worked with the Kids Against Hunger Utica Michigan Satellite to package 50,000 meals in the "Race To Feed Hungry Children." KAH is a nonprofit humanitarian food relief organization that mobilizes food assembly lines. Some of the food went to the Hope Center in Macomb.
